Positive sentences	have done has done	have been doing has been doing
Negative sentences	haven't/hasn't done	haven't/hasn't been doing
Questions	have you done? has she done?	have you been?

Use of Present Perfect Simple

 - Have you been to Paris?
 - No, I haven't, but I've just bought some books about it.
- 2. Mennyi ideje tart az adott állapot?
 - How long have you lived here?
 - For ten years. Actually, I've lived here since I started primary school.

Present Perfect Simple vs Progressive

Present Perfect Simple

- Have you had lunch <u>yet</u>?
- How long have you had this recipe?
- I've made lunch for you.

 Are you hungry?
- Pl'm hot. I've made <u>50</u> pancakes.

Present P. Progressive

- Have you been making lunch? It smells great.
- How long have you been cooking?
- ■I've been making lunch since you got here.
- ■I'm hot. I've been making pancakes all morning.

Perfect versus Past Simple

- My aunt has written loads of romantic stories.
- I've broken my leg. It hurts.
- I haven't seen Jim this morning. <u>He's really late</u>.
- Our teacher has lived in Ireland for a while. <u>She</u> <u>sends emails</u> every now and then.

- Shakespeare wrote the most beautiful love tragedy of all times.
- I broke my leg <u>yesterday</u>.
- I didn't see Jim this morning. Is he coming in the afternoon?
- Our teacher lived in Ireland for a while. <u>She often speaks</u> about her experiences.
